



LCL is creating a fun, interactive space that is appealing to kids and teens of all ages at our Downtown Newark location.

After 20 years of continuous use, the Youth Services level is showing its age. A refresh is needed that provides better safety, security and lines of sight. The kids need an area where they can use their imagination and play.

The new space, set to open in May, will have designated space for early literacy, tweens and teens. An expanded programming space that is modern and inviting will enable us to host large groups. Two gaming rooms, a space for tutoring as well as a family comfort room are all being added so we meet the needs of our community.

While the improvements are happening, access to the lower level is closed. Programming is continuing but is reduced and being conducted in other areas of the Library—check online or just ask and we'll point you in the right direction. American Indians Return to the Newark Earthworks

MARCH 12 | 7 PM

Hundreds of federally recognized American Indians from across the country have traveled to Newark in recent years to visit our earthworks. In anticipation of the Spring Open House for the Octagon Earthworks, John Low and Richard Shiels will talk about the experience of Indians from Oklahoma and Michigan who have made the visit and the American Indian leaders who are active in the effort to inscribe the Newark Earthworks on the UNESCO World Heritage List.

Richard Shiels, Associate Professor Emeritus, specializes in American religious history and has served as the Director of the Newark Earthworks Center, an interdisciplinary center of The Ohio State University for studying and teaching about ancient earthworks and Native American history and life. He was the recipient of The Ohio State University-Newark Teaching Excellence Award in 1977, 1985, and 1988.

John N. Low, Associate Professor of Comparative Studies and citizen of the Pokagon Band of Potawatomi Indians, is the current Director of the



Center. He has previously served as Executive Director of the Mitchell Museum of the American Indian in Evanston, Illinois, and as a member of the Advisory Committee for the Indians of the Midwest Project at the D'Arcy McNickle Center for American Indian and Indigenous Studies at the Newberry Library.



Empowered Women: Katharine Coman and American the Beautiful



Building Bridges with Educators

AMY GANTT, COMMUNITY CONNECTIONS COORDINATOR

The essence of community is connecting with people, building relationships and meeting needs. In effort to serve our community of lifelong learners, Licking County Library (LCL) is listening and partnering with schools. The schools in Licking County reach a broad range of ages and abilities and LCL is working alongside educators and help in a variety of avenues.

One of the avenues is bringing our Tech Trainers to schools so they can introduce eContent services to students. Often times these services aid in school projects, papers and required reading. They also introduce students to digital books, audiobooks, magazines, music and movies that they can utilize on their own time—all for free!

A Teacher's Collection is another way LCL helps local educators. Teachers have the ability to borrow a canvas bag full of books for their classrooms with a longer loan period than an average library card. The special service enables teachers to get a variety of books on one subject, or multiple books of the same title—or any collection of materials that fit their needs—while saving them time. This resource is free and available to all teachers in our service area.

Additional ways we connect with educators include: coordinating tours of the Library; facilitating book clubs and book talks; and offering "celebrity reader" sessions. We often offer a presence at open houses, literacy nights, parents/teacher conferences and

resource fairs so we can promote library card sign-ups and programming. We provide services and programs for students with special needs. Last, but certainly not least, each of our library locations promote our Summer Library Program at schools throughout Licking County.

Collaboration opportunities are always evolving. We are constantly brainstorming to see how we mutually can best reach students and their families. Licking County Library is building bridges with educators. It's an essential piece of empowering our community members to thrive.



F6F Hellcat Crash in St. Louisville

The years between 1942 and 1955 saw six military aircraft accidents in Licking County, most of which have been forgotten. One of these accidents happened near St. Louisville, Ohio.

On Saturday, June 25, 1952, Lieutenant Robert R. Wilson, 29, was serving with the Naval Reserve as the operations officer of five planes that left Port Columbus about 10:30 a.m. The lieutenant was from Chillicothe, Ohio. He enlisted in the Navy in 1942 and completed his preflight training in Iowa City. Robert earned his wings in September 1943 at Corpus Christi, Texas. Through the years, he served as a test pilot at the Naval Air Facilities Station in Trenton, New Jersey. In 1946, he received his discharge from the Navy and entered the Naval Reserve. In 1948, he graduated from The Ohio State University with a degree in Mechanical Engineering.

Witnesses of the crash reported that they had heard the five Grumman F6F Hellcats in the area doing maneuvers for about an hour. According to articles in the *Newark Advocate* and *Chillicothe Gazette*, they reported the planes were approximately 4,000 feet above the ground, as they entered a light cloud. Lieutenant Wilson seemed unable to pull out of a turn he was making and crashed to the ground. Some reported seeing black smoke, but no flames coming from the hellcat, as it descended.

Earl Cliver, who lived within a mile of the crash, was in the house with his wife Lola and heard the planes roaring overhead. Then came an explosion. He and his wife rushed out of the home and saw smoke billowing from a hilltop on the Fred Jenkins farm. The Jenkins farm on Hillcrest Road was about three miles northeast of St. Louisville, between Horns Hill Road and Martinsburg Road.

The remaining Navy planes tried to report where the crash was located, but since they were not familiar with the area, they apparently were unable to give an accurate location and returned to Port Columbus. *Newark Advocate* reporters saw the smoke from the scene of the crash while they were on State Route 13 north of Van Atta. Sheriff's deputies, however, reported they could not see any smoke as they tried to locate the crash. Newark resident Kenneth W. Colman was flying with a different squadron from Zanesville when he heard about the crash on his radio. He flew over to the area and guided rescuers to the scene. It had been about an hour since Wilson's plane had crashed.

Those that were first on the scene discovered that the plane had split into four pieces and left a debris field about 50 yards in diameter in the open field. The first Navy personnel that arrived reported that the area was so hot from the fire that they could not retrieve Wilson's body for a couple of hours.

Lieutenant Robert Reeves Wilson was laid to rest at Union Cemetery in Franklin County. He left behind his wife, Sheila Maria, and their three-year-old son, Robert Reeves Wilson Jr.


